General Committee Meeting

July 26, 2017 Saint John XXIII Pastoral Center South Charleston, West Virginia

Krista Farley, Chair, called the KPEPC General Membership meeting to order at 12:00 p.m. Bill Porterfield moved that the minutes of the May 31, 2017, meeting be approved; Keith Hobbs seconded the motion and the minutes were unanimously approved as written.

Attendees introduced themselves and gave the name of their company/organization.

<u>Get Alarmed West Virginia</u>: Krista reported that the American Red Cross (ARC) is partnering with the WV State Fire Marshall's office and Volunteer WV on *Get Alarmed West Virginia* as part of the *Governor's Day to Serve Campaign*. The WV State Fire Marshal will be recruiting volunteers to reach communities throughout West Virginia to hold installation events from September 9 through October 14, 2017.

<u>Sound the Alarm - Save a Life</u>: There is also a National ARC campaign called *Sound the Alarm, Save a Life,* September 23, 2017 through October 14, 2017. This campaign coincides with Fire Prevention Week. The goal is to install 100,000 smoke alarms during that time throughout the country including the 1 millionth alarm as part of the ARC Home Fire Campaign. The cities in West Virginia that have been selected are Charleston and Beckley. The goal is to install 800 alarms in Charleston and 750 alarms in Beckley. C.W. Sigman suggested that our volunteer organizations make sure that they actually install the smoke alarms for the recipients.

Krista Farley provided a slide presentation with alarming statistics. Every eight minutes, we respond to a disaster - the vast majority are home fires. Home fires kill more people in America annually than all natural disasters combined. Children and the elderly are the most

vulnerable populations. Seven people die in the U.S. home fires daily. That's why the Home Fire Campaign launched in 2014, have already made more than 390,000 households safer by:

- Installing Smoke Alarms
- Changing Batteries
- Helping Families Make Escape Plans
- Targeting High-Risk Neighborhoods

Bob Sharp thanked the ARC and all the volunteers who have helped with the installation of smoke alarms in our area. Bob stated that the State Fire Marshal's office has witnessed the reporting of unacceptable numbers of fire fatalities due to numerous preventable fire incidents. There has been an unacceptable loss of life to precious families, friends, and neighbors. We have to enlist partners from several organizations working together to help eliminate these tragedies.

Bob reported that as part of this year's *Governor's Day to Serve*, the State Fire Marshal's office is partnering with the ARC's *Sound the Alarm – Save a Life* initiative. We want to enlist fire departments, colleges and universities, churches, fraternal and community service organizations, and all who are willing to help.

Bob stated that this initiative will provide and install free smoke alarms to all residential households in need, as identified through canvassing efforts that will be conducted prior to the scheduled event time period. They are looking to serve as many communities as possible throughout the state, starting on the Saturdays of September 9, 16, 23, and 30, and then culminating with this initiative on October 14. Bob Sharp also mentioned a Tap To Talk application (app) that was initiated in 2013. The app could be downloaded to almost every electronic device, enabling people with non-verbal communication skills to communicate with emergency responders in the event of emergencies. Bob stated that this was a unique tool but is no longer functional. Regina Mayolo of the West Virginia Assistive Technology Systems (WVATS) has reported that they are working to recreate Tap To Talk and the KPEPC members will be kept updated.

Jacque reported that she has been working on the following projects:

- Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV/Drone) Grant with C.W. Sigman (WV Dept. of Military Affairs & Homeland Security.
- Finalized the KPEPC 2016 Annual Report and sent to be printed & bound, then distribute.

NEW BUSINESS:

Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) (Drone Grant):

C.W. Sigman reported that bids have been received for the UAV purchase-\$18,000 per unit including two days of training for 8 people. The emergency managers have reviewed and are ready to move forward. C.W. stated that the UAV grant is for \$150,000 and we plan to make these UAV's available to as many agencies as possible. It will be mandatory for the receivers of the UAV to complete the required training. Federal guidelines have to be followed for owners/operators of the drones.

Kanawha-Putnam Health & Medical Disaster Planning Subcommittee:

Krista Farley reported that there will be a subcommittee meeting following the KPEPC General Membership meeting, starting at 1:00 p.m. Janet Briscoe and Seth Staker will facilitate the meeting. The purpose of the meeting will be to review coordination of health and medical response efforts and assess community health and medical needs in the event of an emergency or disaster.

Greater Kanawha Valley Long-Term Recovery Committee:

Krista Farley reported that she and C.W. Sigman continue to work with the long-term recovery efforts of the June 23rd, 2016 floods. The recovery is still in progress and volunteers are trying to be recruited before winter weather approaches.

Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP):

David Hoge reported that a Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP) course will be held on September 19 & 20 at the Tri-State Fire Academy in Huntington. The course is free and registration is being managed through CourseMill (<u>www.onlinetraining.wv.gov/dmapscm6</u>). The course will focus on the skills and processes to develop, manage, and evaluate all kinds of exercises.
